





I've heard all about the price of oil and how that affects our hobby. I've heard about the import taxes and I've heard about the high cost of producing molds and how a company should be able to recover those costs. I've heard that everyone gets a little mark-up to make a profit. In my sixty plus years I think I've heard it all!


I don't consider myself a whiner but I'm a little tired of the explanations. How much plastic is really in that little box? How much R & D is involved with molds that have been around as long as me (or even more)? I wonder just how much mark-up is really involved as everyone in the chain gets his piece of the pie.

I don't know what the R & D costs are on the new kits being produced and thirty or forty dollars for a larger kit is not unreasonable. But, now we see tiny aircraft with a wingspan of three or four inches getting there. Still, we're looking at new tooling and even though exorbitant to me I guess it may be justified. I personally can't bring myself to spend that kind of money for something that small.

So what is the answer? I will buy an older kit and work on it to bring it up to standards. The problem is, those older kits are getting way out of my reach. For example, a Revell B–17 (The old Memphis Belle molds) now lists for \$45.00. That's a kit that was less than \$5.00 back in the day. Now how can that be justified? No more plastic. No new R & D, just an old kit re-boxed and sold for nine times its original cost. Oh yea, the box is probably a little bigger! (Have you noticed how some of these newer offerings seem to hide in the corner of the box when opened?) I saw the old Monogram B– 52/X–15 kit "on Sale" today for \$69.00, "ON SALE"! I know mine wasn't \$20.00. That must be at least \$40.00 worth of plastic!

Well, I purchased a Frog/Novo Supermarine attacker on E-Bay recently for less than ten dollars and snickered to myself while waiting for it to arrive. What a buy, I practically stole it! Did you know that some of the early frog kits had no cockpit detail, just a pilots head sticking up, and you can see right through from front to the rear? I guess I better get working on it before I start ranting on about old kits too.





# **Bases and Stands**


At last September's meeting we discussed bases and stands. Pretty much anything can be used as a base. A good start for a base if you're doing dioramas is an old picture frame. You can even use a rock like we have seen at some of the contests. If you building a diorama most likely you will have to build a base to the size you will need. All that is needed is a piece of wood and some molding to dress up the edge.

When it comes to stands the materials are endless. You can use almost anything, some are cheaper than others but again it all depends on what and where you want to display it. If you built a model with lots of detail on the underside a mirror will be your best choice to show off all that hard work. If you want to dress it up a little, glue it to a piece of wood and finish it with molding or trim work.

The simplest base would be piece of wood stained and clear coated. Again you can dress it up a little with a router. Just zip the edges with a router and presto you turned a plain piece of wood into a nice decorative base. I like to glue some felt to the bottom of my stands. This prevents it from scratching the furniture, and it makes your base look like it was professionally made.

Stands can be used on all types of models. Most plane and sci-fi models that are on stands are in flight. A piece of metal or plastic rod can be used to give your model flight. To attach the rod you can either drill a hole or glue a magnet to the end. Magnets allow you to remove the model for easy transport and cleaning. The plus side to using a magnet is it prevents your model from being knocked off by a slight bump. Ship models are often on stands but are much shorter. You can make a mold of a candle holder and cast it to use as a stand for a ship. The types and style of materials is endless. From wood to Granite from plain to fancy there is a display stand for any décor. Ships would look good on a nice piece of marble or granite. If you think that granite or marble are too expensive. Check around at some of the granite shops. They almost always have scrap pieces. The same goes for cabinet shops. They always have scrap pieces of high quality wood that will look very nice stained.


