that show top notch scale models; and in every IPMS event (at least in the USA and Mexico) there are huge numbers of excellent models that make it tough on the judges.


So, at Model Fiesta 33, let's make it especially tough on the judges - bring your models that have won awards in the past to compete in this year's "Previous Contest Winners" category!!

- 1. President, Jerry Escobedo, opened the meeting and acknowledged three guests.
- 2. Tom Sprawls, Vice-President introduced our **Guest Speaker**,

Dick Montgomery, Past IPMS/USA President and Secretary. Dick talked about the trip that he had made to the IPMS/UK 50th Anniversary National Convention at Telford, England, this past November along with 35 other modelers from the US and Canada. All attendees provided their own airfare to England and joined a tour group that had been arranged by a London-based travel agency. The tour group was driven by coach to many historic locations and military museums while in country culminating at the Telford IPMS/UK National Convention. Dick arrived in London a few days before the tour group got together and saw many of the historic sites and tourist attractions in London on his own. He discussed all of the Military museums that the tour group saw together, and pointed out the differences and similarities between the US and UK National Conventions. He emphasized the international flavor of the UK event and the many languages being spoken around you. Naturally, he took lots of pictures and said that he'd send Jerry Escobedo URLs of all of the different locations for Club members to peruse at their leisure.

3. Tom followed up by encouraging Club members to volunteer to demonstrate

Additionally, we'll inaugurate our "Afternoon Builders Group" at the same place and time frame.
- 7. Jerry conducted the 2013 Model of the Year contest of the best winning model of the past year. Kent Knebel's 1/48 scale Deperdussin, vintage

airplane, was chosen by Club members as the winning model. **Congratulations Kent!**

- 8. Tom mentioned that we need to approve or modify, if needed, the 2014 proposed Quarterly Contest Themes proposed by Mike Picard that appeared in the January Newsletter. He reviewed the themes and asked for any discussion on changes. It was suggested that the December theme be moved to another month since it would conflict with our annual Christmas party. It was suggested that November be substituted for the December theme month with no change in the theme itself. A motion was made to accept the 2014 Themes as submitted and modified. The motion passed.
- 9. Jerry conducted the Show-N-Tell portion of the program and photographed the 2013 Model of the Year and those models that were discussed during Show-N-Tell.
- 10. Lastly, Lee announced that our three visitors had all joined the Club that evening. Please welcome, Michael Goolsbee, Gilberto Ojeda, and Marc Smith as Alamo Squadron's newest members. Welcome Aboard guys!



WW2 veteran, will let me know and suggest another plane to add to my catalog.

People suggest models all the time that they would like to see added to my catalog. The models I design are usually subjects that interest me, quite often from an artistic point of view, but I get very excited when I hear of someone's connection to a particular aircraft, as in the case of Jerry meeting the original Pilot.

Little Ambassador took me about 3 days to produce (not including the hours spent on research for the aircraft).

The process to designing a model like the Little Ambassador is pretty simple really, since a "template" for the P-51B has already been created.

I already have P-51 A, B, C and D models in my collection.

I start with a 3D design of the aircraft

which is separated into flat 2D parts. Parts that will be printed on regular Letter size Cardstock and then cut out and assembled in a very similar method to older "stick and tissue" construction models. Paper Aircraft models are generally a "skin" fuselage and wings assembled over top of frames or formers (bulkheads and wing spars and ribs).

Creating the basic model template is the biggest part of the job, taking a few months to complete, but once that's done I can bang out different versions of the model almost as quickly as people can request them. I am only slowed down by the research element of the project.

Once a blank paper model template is created I can add surface colours and textures, markings and artwork...which

will turn that particular model into a recognizable craft. Being an artist graphic designer by trade, this is the fun part for me. I work in a high Computer Drawing and Painting program to produce all my artwork and the finished model file, which is then turned into a

these like the plague because of regular inconsistencies and inaccurate depictions. The fact is there are a number of great artists putting in a lot of time and effort to produce the best looking and most accurate artwork possible. Unfortunately they run into the same problems of historical accuracy due to information being passed down and repeated over time, inconsistent and unreliable eyewitness information ...and artistic license. My artwork is no better, and I make no claims about the accuracy of my scale models, but I like to start from basics, use as much information as possible and come up with my own theories and depiction of the aircraft based on what I think is the most reliable evidence I can find. For me, the best evidence is always original photographs if I can find them. Only after searching for those, will I start compiling and referring to "facts" found in books, on forums, and from people whose advice I trust.

My time spent on many Internet forums has rewarded me with many educated contacts who can provide me with little tidbits of information. For example,

I have a friend who has been researching and compiling a list of all known Mustang aircraft and can usually provide me with the "Special Project Number" that appears on almost every US Mus-

that appears on almost every US Mustang, stenciled underneath the serial

PDF document that the modeler can print from.

One of the most fascinating parts of the entire process is researching each individual aircraft. When the "Little Ambassador" was suggested to me, I was given the basic information I need to get started..the name of the aircraft and the Pilot. That is usually all I start with, but in many cases (like this one) Jerry will send me one or two pictures he has found on the internet. He often sends me

artist paintings and profile artworks of the individual planes, and while they might give me a visual illustration of that particular aircraft, I never use these as reference material. In fact I avoid


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number on the left side of the fuselage. On a scale model of this size, its a detail that is so small when printed it can't be seen clearly. But I know its there. And if I can add one more thing that is accurate, that's what I try to do.





Sometimes I get it wrong. But hopefully it gets fixed before the model goes

into the shop. In the case of the "Little

vintage photograph that I found, that

the aircraft had a "pinup girl" painted

on the left side of the cockpit. However

the photo quality was poor and the

pinup was not clearly visible. Knowing

a little bit about 1940s pinup artwork by

painters like Petty and Vargas, I immediately recognized it as a similar style

and was able to find a close match for

the image used. From that I created

artwork and attached it to the model.

Ambassador", it was obvious from a

that the pinup was not painted on to the aircraft. It was in fact a paper pinup, cut from a magazine or calendar, and varnished to the side of the aircraft.

A different Vargas image was suggested and after another look through the Pinup catalogs, I found the exact and correct pinup that was used.

In this case I was able to alter my artwork

before the model had been added to my catalog, but there have been cases where I had to modify a model when new information came to light after the model's release. Regardless, I always try to make things right.

Prefinished model parts mean that markings and


paint schemes are accurate and consistent. No fumbling with exactly where to position that decal! And no worrying about painting and artistic skills when it

comes to surface weathering and realistic texturing.

Prefinished model parts mean you can complete a paper model with the simplest of tools. Printing out a paper Model using your Home Printer could not be any easier, but if you want to improve

the look even more you can opt for professional printing on better quality cardstocks. Not all paper models use prefinished parts, but it is one of the most appealing aspects of preprinted and digital paper models. There are many paper modelers

who build using paper and card, but complete their models with fillers and hand painting. Even though paper modeling is as old as history itself, the recent use of Computers and computer aided design has resulted in amazingly accurate scale models with amazingly detailed textures and finishes. Nowadays, plastic and paper models are designed in exactly the same way...the only differences are how the parts are produced and the final retail cost of the model. There are advantages and appeal to both forms of modeling, but you sure can't beat the fact that an individ-



ual Paper Model part can be reprinted as needed... and one PaperModel Kit can yield an unlimited number of builds.
