




Dave Bowers, Randal Cooper and all the great guys of The MTMA are known for putting on a solid modeling show. They overcame several challenges to successfully put on their 30th ANNUAL SHOW!!! The primary challenges being the new location and the weather.

Not a lot you can do about the weather. It didn't bother our crew but I understand it prevented some folks from north and west of the state to attend. Model entries were clearly affected but the vendors area looked very busy all day.

The location for the show was new to the group this year, economics and other issues making them leave their longtime location at Tennessee Tech. The new place is the main exhibit hall of the Cumberland County Fairgrounds which has three distinct divided areas which the group used effectively to have a model display hall, a vending hall, and an adjacent hall used for a breakout table relaxation area for folks to sit and talk or enjoy the snacks and food provided by the local 4-H


Dave tells us they have only a handful of people working behind the scenes to put on their show. It

Modeling Contest

Possibly the most important aspect of any AMPS event is the Modeling Contest. As anyone who has been to the show knows, the AMPS judging system has led the way in terms of fairness and credibility. Judging is done by a group of four judges, who evaluate each entry - not by what is wrong with it, but by what is right with it! To ensure fairness, the lowest score of the four is removed, and the other three are added. There is no actual competition, the entrants are competing only against themselves using a defined schedule of values for comparison. Experience levels are established to eliminate the intimidation factor so often associated with most shows.

The AMPS Difference

Every year, people come from all over the world to experience what most consider to be the most fair and honest judging system available. As described above, AMPS judging is based on an open system, designed to reward the modeler for good work. To enable the modeler to present his most positive points to the judges, the system establishes five different classifications with which the modeler identifies himself, based on his own skill level. When the entry comes to be judged, it is reviewed to establish the skill level of the competitor and then judged accordingly. The classifications are described as follows:

Junior - Specifically set up for the younger modeler, this class gives the modeler the best chance to grow in the hobby and experience the AMPS philosophy.


Basic - This group is set up for the beginner modeler, and those of us who are just getting back into modeling after a long layoff (i.e. school or family).

Intermediate - By far the largest group, it includes modelers of varying skill levels who do not regularly enter competition or do not regularly win or place.

Advanced - For the more skilled modeler, these modelers regularly win or place in local and regional competitions.







Roy's Future Wash

(Reprinted from our October 2013 edition in preparation for the demo next Monday Night)

Hands down the best wash ever for highlighting detail in areas such as gearbays, cockpits, wheel hubs engines, anywhere you have a lot of raised ribs, bolts, rivets, corners and such... anywhere that the wash can collect and do its magic. It also will work well with sunken detail such as grates and screens and holes, but a little more about this later. What's so great about it is the beautiful gradated shadows it creates around the details. As the Future collects in corners and around details, the pigment is denser in these areas. You will never get the clumpy pigment separation that you get when you thin enamels too much.

What this wash is NOT good for is large open areas such as doing a panel line wash. Use something else, this is not for that.

Its quite simple to make. I get a small mixing dish or bottle cap or something. I work in small batches, but some prefer to mix a whole bottle. The ratio is dead simple.

50% Future (Pledge)50% tap waterA few drops of acrylic paint to taste.

My advice is to get some scrap parts with lots of detail on them. paint them a base color. Practice on these parts till you get it down. The reason is that this is a one shot thing. Once its on, its on. It dries quickly, so you have to work somewhat quickly. Sounds scary? Nah! You just need to make friends with it.

Its the best wheel wash ever. Once the future and water is mixed. add a drop of paint (I use Pollyscale scale black, sometimes with a touch of brown) Stir it up. With a number 0 or 1 sized brush, flood the wash into the area you want to wash. Work quickly. Not too quickly, or you will get bubbles. Avoid pooling on open areas. You may want to have some paper towel handy to blot up excess like this. Soak up excess pooling on corners with your wiped clean paintbrush. Pooling is fine, you just want to absorb large amounts. You will get the feel for it quickly. Let it dry. You can get a range from barely hinted at shadows to quite stark, depending on how much paint you have. Some subtle staining of the walls will occur, but it is subtle, and adds a nice used look to the gearbay or cockpit or wheel you are washing. The great thing is if you think its too subtle. wait 30 minutes and do it again.

One thing to watch out for is bubbles. They tend to happen in recessed detail if you work too quickly. I blow across them to pop the bubbles. Most will pop on their own.

The guys who have adopted this wash absolutely love it. Try it. I think you will find there is no better way to bring out detail.

If you know what Solvaset is (Walthers Model Railroad Decal solution - VERY Strong - been know to literally dissolve MicroScale decals) it is alcohol but I don't know what strength. MicroSol seems to not smell as strong but I understand it is some type of alcohol too.

All the vinegar in MicroSet does is act as a wetting agent to "make water slicker" though it does help make the decal conform.

MicroSol does make the decal soften a whole lot.

For the price and considering the "risk" it is all too easy to just buy the Micro Products and use them for convenience and to minimize risk, even if Vinegar is cheaper by the gallon.

Back in the 1960s Walthers made Model R/R decals that were nice and accurate (easy to do when your reference material is just outside the door or down the street at the R/R crossing) but very thick and needed the strong solution

Jeff Subject: Re: Decal Question I FULLY AGREE You need both!!!! And a month from now when MicroAeroModelDecalABTETC comes out with a sheet you need it too!!!! I am reminded of one of the decal seminars I went to at a nationals a few years ago. There is a who subculture that collects decal sheets!!! Nothing wrong with that. I don't know if there is a big 27 investment value out there (but could be!!! think about Ed's Space Shuttle decal). I think it was FOXOne Decals (a small one/two man operation) that produced some really neat Phantom and B-1 decals sheets who said when they released new sheets there were people who had standing orders to buy 4 or so sheets for their closet (or resale when they were out of print!!!)

Another thought is that a decal sheet is like a book! It is another reference on the markings with "commentary" by the producer on what he sees in the photographs!!!!! (or real plane as the case may be)

Buy it and savor the knowledge.

Bill Von Staden used to espouse the modelling theory of "critical mass" I think he is right on that point, at least to a degree. Once you obtain enough stuff (kits, resin, photo etch, decals, books, etc.) you achieve critical mass. The potential energy in critical mass..... When you achieve critical mass you build it!!! (goes back to SUBJECT MATTER INTEREST!!!) I must be close to a nuclear explosion on several projects!!!!! The other point of the seminar at that nationals was to seal up your decals sheets in poly-bags to keep the moisture content in equilibrium (not too dry - not too wet) and protect your stash of decals from silverfish. They are attracted to the glue. Also decals on blue paper tend to be better than decals on white paper. Cartagraph decals have lead in their ink. That is allowed in Italy not in the US - that is why Cartagraph ink is more opaque than MicroScale. MicroSet is just white vinegar. Good seminar!!!!!

BTW Jeff If you got \$1 for an ESCI sheet you did good!!!!!! They were prolific in the day and did a great job of putting decals out there from the subjects in Profile Publications. I know you are old enough to know who they were! They tend not to age well as decals though. Their shelf like seems short to me. The seem to yellow up very easy and the glue just doesn't stick. Still if the subject of interest is on one of their sheets they may be the only game in town......

Well, it's only my opinion, but if it were markings I was highly enamored of, I'd keep the Aeromaster sheet AND pick up the Print Scale sheet. I'd also go ahead and buy the Print Scale sheet now, before it goes out of print and the ebay price for it sky rockets!

And yes, as a modeler, you are responsible for your own research if you want to be sure that your model is as accurate as you can make it. The number of poorly researched or poorly interpreted decals out there is too large to count.

I THOUGHT OF IT FIRST! No, really, it did cross my mind ... along with a few dozen other things ... Maybe I better start at the beginning (no, I won't sing the song although it did come to mind). I've been holding an AeroMaster set that included a very nice subject of a 109F-4 of 9./JG 3 in the summer of 1942 with very striking camouflage of tan, green, gray, and light blue (reference Oberfeldwebel Eberhard Von Boremski). This set I've held onto as that scheme has been "on the back burner" in my mind and I didn't wish to part with it yet. Then, all of a sudden, whilst perusing rebelalpha on eBay (Scotts Model Workshop), I find that Print Scale does a sheet with the same markings. Now it appears I really don't need to hold onto my AeroMaster set. Or do I? THAT is the crux of my question.

So, if I'm hearing correctly, a modeler must do his research on the decal AS WELL as on the kit for a particular subject in mind. I have no objections to holding onto the AeroMaster set and then getting the Print Scale set when I "get around" to building that particular craft. I guess it ends up being personal preference in a lot of ways.

Thank you for your input.

One of those things that comes late in the build but is so crucial.....

You invest a lot of time in a model and then at what is one of the later stages in a build very significant issues can arise. There is definitely an economy of scale some where in here. You don't want to invest months in the build and paintwork only to lose the whole thing at the last minute cause a decal doesn't fit. Easy to be penny wise and dollar foolish.

A wee bit of philosophy is in order here. Your approach is important on this subject. If you are a "kit builder" (looking for the pleasure of the build and a very presentable product) then basic decal quality is most important. You would tend to want a thin decal that lays well and doesn't silver. If you are a "modeler" (Latin term - miniaturist historical accuraturist) then you still want the non silvering aspect but you become more interested in accuracy of the decal marking itself. That being said now what..... Well you really want both. What a wasted paragraph!!! Well not really because at some point you may have to compromise. I guess that is an example of the "Art of Modeling" Decals just ain't black and white - No play on Lt Gray's slogan intended

I think of prime importance is to pick a subject that you'll stick with and keep your interest in till you are completed. If you lose interest you may not weather over some of those issues that come up. At some point the decal companies are interpreting the prototype markings they are trying to replicate. They may or may not get things right from what is your perspective. That is why you do your own research - to get your own perspective and to judge if the decal company got it right. I've had the pleasure of owning decals sheets from multiple sources of what was allegedly the same airplane at the same point in historical time. The differences between interpretations was absolutely incredible. I first saw this many years ago when building the B-17F "The Memphis Belle" I had the Revell kit decals, an early MicroScale sheet and what was leading edge at the time - an ESCI sheet. The ADF letter codes for the sides of the fuselage were very different between the sheets. The thickness of the stroke in the fonts was dramatically different with the MicroScale being so narrow it was really useless. The ESCI guys were spot on in this department but other markings for other parts of the airframe were best from the MicroScale sheet. I ended up with a Frankenstein approach using the best markings piece by piece between the three sheets. While historically accurate it really was a lousy model. The differing opacities of the yellow between the three sheets was so distracting from the completed model. YUK!!!!! So many lessons from my teenage years.

Fortunately in these more modern times the opacity of decals and the overall quality is such that more often than not I find myself somewhat successfully "cross kitting" between decal sheets.

The other day I steered you towards thin decals and I still stand by that statement of preferring thin decals. I do have two quick exceptions to that "rule". The old very British Modeldecal sheets though thick seems to react well to the usual solutions and snuggle down really well. You also get the benefit they are incredibly well researched and they provide you with what amounts to a book with photos on their instruction sheet. It is written in such small font they pack a lifetime of information in such a small area. Likewise the current Hasegawa decal sheets that come in the box are thick when judged on the paper but they seem to work very well for me! An added advantage to both of these sources is I believe in both cases they actually have built the model using their decals sheets. Modeldecal frequently makes notes on their instruction sheet that the marking is sized to fit a particular brand kit or to adjust certain things to make a more accurate model That the decals actually fit on the model is very important. You would think mathematically shrinking the prototype marking down to the proper scale would work. It should were this a perfect world. Hasegawa's old A-4 and TA-4J kits are a great example. I don't remember the numbers but the fuselage is like really 1/67 scale and the wings 1/65 or something like that. Point being they are larger than the real plane. This can be an issue when lining up things to match the markings to panel lines like you see in the photo of the real plane. Pitch in curvature of the structure where the marking fits, lumps and bumps, etc. It can be tough. Anyway Mike sat this up by bringing up my TwoBobs experience. I'll have to tell that one in person! They ob-

I think you're over thinking this. It is not unusual in my experience to see schemes duplicated by different companies and it is not unusual for me to purposely buy two sheets from two companies with the same scheme just to see what might be different and which one I like better. I wouldn't choose to sell a sheet JUST because it has a scheme duplicated on another sheet. Nor would I think the fact that a scheme is duplicated on another sheet would impact a sale of that sheet unless there was something very wrong and also very well known.

There are so many good decal companies out there these days that I would have a very hard time saying I really look for sheets from a certain company. I tend to focus on finding sheets with markings I want. About the only companies I really avoid are Blue Rider (specialist WWI stuff) and Ventura, both of whom I've had bad experiences with. I can already hear Mr. Petty typing about his low level of respect for Two Bobs.... In my opinion, if you are looking to sell a decal stash, there are two keys....pricing and presentation. If I'm at a show, or browsing ebay, I'm looking to spend under \$6 for a decal sheet unless it's new. Last year I sold probably about 300 sheets. I sold a bunch at Richmond at \$5-\$7 per sheet. And then in Marietta I sold the balance all at once for \$500. That was only about \$2.75 a sheet, but I got rid of all of them at once and didn't have to deal with them anymore. As for presentation, I had them all organized into binders by plane type so folks didn't have to paw through a bunch of stuff they weren't interested in.

A. Summary Data:

- B. Thoughts to revise judging (schedule related)
 - 1. Judge the Automotive Class NNL Style (pros: Popular vote no judge required; predictable number of automotive awards, Straw pole indicates this to be a popular move among car modelers.)
 - 2. All other model classes to remain G-S-B
 - 3. Revise the computer work to a cloud/network database. (combined with a registration database) Tim's input here
 - 4. Reduce the data that each judge has to print on each judges form. (four pieces of data for each judge form before he begins judging: (Table number...entrant number...entrant name...model number...model name...)
 - 5. The model number is typically 4 digits. The box for this on the form is much too small. The bigger box for the 3-digit entrant number is additionally confusing—Several judges inadvertently transposed the two occasionally.
 - 6. Judges poor handwriting caused confusion. Also judges frequently failed to add up the scores.
 - 7. Be sure the person registering the models has good handwriting! My team may have actually recorded some of the entrant or model numbers incorrectly. [they did]
 - 8. More aggressive judging on Friday night. (resolve conflict with hospitality room put in tandem to reward those who help judge Friday night!)
 - Other thoughts from the members present Saturday?
 Put the three judges sheets under the model for ease of access Maybe special print and cut sheets
- C. Thoughts to revise judging (quality related)
 - 1. NNL style judging for car models (repeat from above)

- 2. Eliminate the historical accuracy point. Many judges simply did this wrong. Conflicts with the SciFi entry, etc.
- 3. Add an additional point for the intangible widening the number of available points from 1 to 2, keeping this base number set on 12.
- 4. Re-emphasize the gold models need to be special models
- 5. Any other thoughts from the members present Saturday? Run Through the Judges Meeting on the Monday Prep Meeting Night to get a few more IPMS Chattanooga Members up to speed to judge Friday night

- 1. Quality of awards was complimented! Including at least one club contacted us considering sourcing theirs from the same place as ours.
- 2. Some consideration for limiting the number of awards to those who enter and win a large amount of awards. What does it mean to win 20 golds for your 21 models entered.? Balance this with the desire to encourage a large number of entries.
- 3. Trophy preparation Need to get these done well before Christmas. No more late night sessions just before the show.
- 4. Any other thoughts from the members present Saturday? Square Shape to be more efficient with raw acrylic

 - 1. Positive noted from the layout this year to put more models visible at the front of the room
 - 2. Eliminate the judges meeting room (economy measure) and hold the judges meeting in the curtained off area.

ModelCon Rules (PROPOSED)

1. Eligibility

a. The contest is open to all modelers. Membership in IPMS/USA and/or AMPS is not required for entry, but is encouraged.

b. Entries may be made of any material, i.e. plastic, wood, metal, paper or any combination thereof.

c. Absentee entries accepted if registered under builder's name. Full Registration fees apply.

d. Pre-assembled entries will not be allowed in any category. This includes die cast, pre-assembled display models, toys, or professional engineering models or builders models.

e. Entries must be the work of the entrant or the entry will be disqualified from any award.

- f. Group entries are encouraged under the name of the group build.
- g. Pre-painted entries will be allowed in the junior category only.

h. Models that have won previous standard category awards at other shows (including IPMS/Nationals or AMPS/Nationals or respective regional's, etc.) are encouraged to enter at ModelCon. Models that have won Best of's or special awards are encouraged to enter the Showcase category at ModelCon. Previous winners of the ModelCon Showcase Award are ineligible for <u>any award</u> but are always welcome to be displayed.

i. Any model considered to be inappropriate or offensive to generally acknowledged standards of taste and acceptability will be removed. The Chattanooga Scale Modelers shall be the sole arbiter in determining if a model is inappropriate or offensive.

2. Class Placement

a. The Contestant will determine the Class Placement of each Entry. The Head Judge reserves the right to move Entries to another Group if such move is clearly warranted. All such moves will be made following reasonable effort to notify the Contestant.

<u>3. Judging</u>

a. Judging shall be conducted using the guidelines set forth by The Chattanooga Scale Modeling Association. In summary the following shall apply:

For classes 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, & 8 The Chattanooga Guidelines for Gold-Silver-Bronze will be used. (For more information see our webpage)

For class 3 (Automotive) the NNL style of judging will be used. (i.e. Popular vote by eligible participants in the respective class divisions.) Those divisions shall be: A. Cars, B. Trucks, C. Motorcycles, D. Vehicular Diorama. Eligible participants will also vote for a best of within this division.

For class 9 (Model Photo) one best of, one gold and one silver award will be available for a select judging team to award.

A team made of head class judges will review the best of's from categories 1 thru 9 to select a Judges Grand Award.

b. Models will not be picked up during the IPMS judging process, unless deemed necessary by the Class Head Judge to determine final class or special award ranking. Reasonable effort will be made to contact affected contestants prior to any large-scale relocation or handling of an affected entries. Models may be gently repositioned to allow access to entry forms, visibility of other entries, or to facilitate placement of models on the viewing tables without said notification.

c. All judges' decisions are final Any attempts to influence judges will result in immediate disqualification of all the contestant's entries.

d. Dust covers should be removed prior to judging. A reasonable attempt to judge a model with a dust cover will be made but the judges will not remove any dust covers and may elect to pass on a model with a cover.

No liability for loss or damage to contest entries is implied or assumed by IPMS/USA, IPMS Chattanooga Scale Modelers Association, the Chattanooga Convention Center, or the contest judges. We can assume no liability or responsibility in case of accidents involving attendees, equipment, merchandise, models, or displays or for property lost, stolen, or damaged during the show.
