I built this model for the "Out Of The Box" Theme build. The kit used was the 25th Anniversary version of the Monogram 'Colonial Viper' (now Revell) from the original Battlestar Galactica TV show. The rules allowed me to use any paint scheme and change the kit decals, so I decided to make my Viper as a futuristic Navy Space Fighter. I created the low-rez decals and painted it in the style of a current jet fighter. The model was very easy to put together with a few seam fit problems that were easily corrected with minimum putty work. It did not include landing gear so that helped with the easy construction. The only real problem I had was in the finishing coat. I sprayed the entire model with Krylon Clear Flat and it literally melted the decals and they 'flowed' into weird shapes. I had never encountered this with my decals and Krylon before, but it required me to replace the decals. Not a fun thing to do at the last minute. Now go build something, Duane.

Re: Eagle Scout Project Brings Running Water to CRSP's Bird Blind

Dear Recipient,

To achieve rank of Eagle Scout, my board-approved Eagle Scout project must be completed by July 28, 2014, my 18th birthday. My project is installing gutters and 2 rain barrels on the bird blind building at Crooked River State Park (CRSP) in St Marys, Ga. The bird feeders are kept filled with bird seed but there has been no running water to keep the bird baths filled with water. The purpose of my Eagle Scout Project is to provide running water for the bird baths and the planned butterfly garden. Only some birds visit the bird feeders, but many birds visit bird baths to splash and drink water. Between the bird baths and feeders, the visiting public can enjoy the birds up-close.

This project has three parts: gutters for the roof, two rain barrels to collect rain and elevated wood platforms to house the rain barrels. I've estimated the cost for this project to be about \$400, depending on material discounts or material donations offered for the project. In addition, I need to provide lunch for my Boy Scout work crew.

The Eagle Scout project packet requires a scout to raise funds to cover the cost of the project. Asking potential sponsors for cash donations is expected of the scout. I will build this project in mid-July. What I am asking of you is if you would PLEASE consider offering a cash donation to help cover project expenses. Your donation will also help provide water for birds, plants and pollinators of Crooked River State Park.

Object 279 Heavy Tank Build by Steve Betts



Object 279 was a Soviet experimental heavy tank developed at the end of 1959. It was a special purpose tank intended for fighting on cross country terrain, serving as a heavy breakthrough tank. Equipped for cross-country capability with its four-track running gear mounted on two longitudinal, rectangular hollow beams, which were used as fuel tanks. The hydro-pneumatic suspension allowed the tank to vary its ground clearance and even sit on the ground. The track chain, running practically along the whole track length provided for cross-country capabilities on swampy terrain, soft soils and area full of cut trees, Czech hedgehogs, antitank obstacles and the like. The tank was equipped with the powerful 1000 hp 2DG-8M diesel engine, enabling the 60 ton tank to attain 34 mph speed, with an

active range of 180 miles. The fighting compartment was sealed to allow the crew to survive both chemical, biological or nuclear attack. The armor was up to 13 inches thick and had a high velocity 130mm anti-tank gun. It was mechanically reliable, however Nikita Khrushchev cancelled the development of any tank that weighed over 37 tons. The Russians wanted tanks with weights suitable for crossing their own bridges, which at that time were unreliable for heavy vehicle crossings.

The kit instructions have 15 steps to complete the assembly. There is also a color painting guide. No decals are required. The parts are molded in dark green and the tracks were a nice metallic rust color. There is also one small sheet of photo etched parts. Some of the photo-etch replaces plastic parts in the kit while others have no plastic equivalent. Opening the box I was a little disappointed as I was expecting a really huge tank but the real one is equivalent to a German Tiger II from WW2. It is still impressive



though, especially with the four sets of tracks. The kit could have been packaged better as mine had several broken pins on the hull, idler wheel mounts and fuel lines. The plastic is very hard which I like, but several parts were attached to the sprues with connections on two perpendicular sides of the parts. It is really hard to remove the excess on the small parts and under the lips on the personnel hatches. There was also flash present on some of the parts. The parts fit together very tight which makes assembly easier. Assembly was very straight forward and it is easy to skip around building things out of sequence and not cause any problems. I started with

fitting the hull top and bottom together but it was warped. I was able to force the halves together and use a lot of clamps to hold it while the glue dried. I would recommend attaching the hull halves together before you add anything else to avoid breaking the smaller parts. The drive teeth on two of the four main drive sprockets did not line up. When I attached the tracks the specified 82 links were a little too tight and 83 links was slightly too slack. Many part numbers did not match between the instructions and the actual parts. By carefully matching the drawings to the parts assembly was still possible. I painted my model overall with Tamiya XF-65 Field Grey and then weathered it with a



slightly darker shade of green. The good thing is that after all of your hard work the model really does look great. It will be a perfect companion for my Maus, A39 Tortoise and T28.




"When Worlds Collide" Kit Review by The Phantom Modeler

When Worlds Collide is a 1951 science fiction film based on the 1933 novel co-written by Philip Gordon Wylie and Edwin Balmer, which was one of science-fiction's first disaster novels. The story is that two planets, Bronson Alpha and Bronson Beta - entered the solar system, and Alpha was on a collision course for Earth. Plans were made to evacuate some of Earth's population to Bronson Beta, and that planet settled into a habitable orbit about the sun. Shot in Technicolor, the film was produced by George Pal and directed by Rudolph Maté. It won the 1951 Academy Award for special effects. This 15' model recreates the Space Ark rocket used by humanity to escape the Earth's destruction.



Pegasus Hobbies is becoming more and more well known for producing nicely detailed kits that are as much a snap-tite as they are a 'standard' model kit. This means very large and very positive alignment pins/holes and not a lot of parts. It is that trait that draws both young and old modelers. These are kits that can be built and enjoyed by modelers of all skill levels. If there might be a drawback, that would be the possibility of large seams, but their previous kits have not really had many problems and parts often fit quite snugly. This kit had a few tiny dimples on the fuselage opposite alignment pins. You will also need to use Tamiya or other specific glues for this as it is made from ABS plastic and many of your standard cements will not work on it.

There are minimal parts with the rocket taking the majority of bits. Two fuselage halves, wings, rocket pods/exhaust and a three piece tail plane takes care of the rocket. The launch sled has nine pieces consisting of a section of launch rail. The base is a piece of vacu-formed ground into which the name plate fits. I must mention that there are no visible entrance hatches along the side as in the movie's rocket. Instructions have six well drawn construction steps and a painting guide. Basically, it's a shiny metal rocket with a grey launch rail (probably a concrete color would work well for this). The model could probably be assembled without painting in about 15 minutes so it is perfect for kids. For me, adding the usual filler, sanding and painting will add about two weeks to the build! No decals, but then the 'real' one had no markings.



Another very cool kit from Pegasus Hobbies. I'm a real sucker for kits like this and it is doubly pleasing that the kit is well engineered. I'm hoping they will continue to offer other craft from various old sci-fi movies as there is a market out there for these things. If you have never built any of their kits, you owe yourself the treat of building them. Simple they are, but they also produce satisfying results. I'm looking at using this kit for our upcoming Sci-Fi Theme Build.






